Quick Tips for Cooperative Dog Grooming

Here are some tips for incorporating cooperative care methods into your dog's grooming routine.


1. **Positive Reinforcement:** Reward your dog with treats, praise, and affection during and after grooming sessions to create a positive association.

2. **Slow Introduction**: Start with short, stress-free sessions and gradually increase the time as your dog becomes more comfortable.

3. **Use the Right Tools**: Choose grooming tools that are suitable for your dog's coat type and size to make the process easier and more comfortable.

4. **Regular Handling**: Get your dog used to being touched and handled outside of grooming sessions, which can help reduce anxiety during grooming.

5. **Desensitization**: Gradually introduce your dog to the grooming tools, such as clippers or brushes, before using them on their coat.



6. **Break it Up:** Divide grooming tasks into smaller, manageable parts. This makes it less overwhelming for your dog.

7. ****Stay Calm****: Your dog can pick up on your emotions, so remain calm and patient throughout the grooming process.

8. **Safety First:** Be cautious with sensitive areas like ears, paws, and the face. Use gentle and steady pressure to avoid accidents.

9. **Know When to Stop **: If your dog gets too stressed or uncomfortable, it's okay to take a break and continue grooming later.

10. ***Professional Help* ******: If your dog has specific grooming needs or severe anxiety, consider consulting a professional groomer or trainer for guidance.

Remember that cooperative care methods can improve your dog's grooming experience and strengthen your bond. Patience and positive reinforcement are key!



Stress Free Pets is an animal handling and behaviour education program, certification and community for Veterinary professionals. This accreditation is available to veterinarians, vet nurses and other vet professionals with the intention of educate and empower Veterinary professionals, clients and the community to create environments and experiences that are free from stress and fear.

This can be an important tool for us as members of a positive

reinforcement club as we do all that we can to minimise the stress our dogs are experiencing. By having Stress Free Pets accredited locations local to us, we can make informed decisions about our animal's veterinary care, and make these experiences as positive as possible.

Can you smell that?

Scent work involves training dogs to search for specific odours from certain essential oils in several situations called 'elements', in containers such as boxes, on the outside of vehicles, inside buildings and in the outside environment. Dogs need to find the source of the odour and communicate its exact location to their owner. Dog and owner teams compete to locate the source of the odour within a set time given by the judge to determine which teams are the fastest and most accurate in their searches. Owners and dogs need to gain several qualifications at each level to progress to more complex searches at higher levels

This sport has been recognized by Dogs Australia since 2020, with competitions starting in 2021, making it a fairly new sport. Did you know FDOC has hosted many scent works trials since then? Here is some more information on the sport https://dogsaustralia.org.au/training-dog-sports/scent-work/

Although FDOC doesn't run any beginner level scentwork classes, there are many in the area for those looking to participate. Just google "scent work training [your location]". As an editor's note here - Blue and I did the intro course through K9 Nose Fun and found that super enjoyable, but there are places like Crazy Canines, Helping Hounds, Awesome K9 Sniffers, that I know of in the area.

Here is a success story from one of our members...

I originally got into scent work when, due to injury, I was told Sasha would never compete in agility again. I was devastated, I wanted to get into some form of dog sports but was not sure what. It was just over twelve months ago I attended my first scent work course, since then Sasha has achieved her novice scent work title, has enough passes in Advance exterior and Advanced vehicles achieving two first places in her last two trials to move into Excellent in those elements. To say I am proud of her is an understatement, I would highly recommend scent work to anyone wanting to do something a bit different.

The Frankston Dog Obedience Club is a Community Organisation and all the trainers, ground keepers, kiosk staff and organisers are volunteers. This means no one gets paid. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Club's Annual General Meeting will be held on <u>Saturday 9th December 2023 at 11.00 a.m.</u> in the clubrooms, McClelland Drive, Frankston. This is your Club and therefore all members are encouraged to attend. In accordance with the Club's constitution, there will be an election of office bearers and committee members as follows:

The **President**, **Treasurer** and **four committee members** are required to stand down or nominate for re-election for a further two year term. Office bearers are required to be financial members of the Victorian Canine Association Inc. and required to remain so during their term in office.

Members wishing to stand for any of the above positions are required to submit a fully completed nomination form and lodge with the Secretary not less than 21 (twenty one) days prior to the meeting. Successful candidates are expected to serve a two year period prior to having to re-nominate. Nominees for President and Vice President must have served on the committee for a full twelve months prior to the Annual General Meeting. Being an office bearer or committee member is no sinecure and the Club requires active administrators who are willing and able to accept responsibility and complete assignments as required by the Club's members and approved by the committee.

Although all members are invited to attend the A.G.M., voting rights are restricted to financial members who have been members for at least 3 (three) months preceding the meeting. One vote only is permitted per membership. Junior / Student members shall not be eligible to vote or hold office as an office bearer or ordinary member of committee. Members unable to attend may request a postal vote where the number of nominations exceeds the vacancies. Applications for a postal vote must be lodged in writing with the Secretary 14 (fourteen) days prior to the A.G.M.

Notices of other (special) business to be placed on the meeting agenda must be submitted in writing to the Secretary 21 (twenty one) days prior to the A.G.M.


As for our home competitions, our teams have been racing superbly. Our Let's Do It & On The Fly have been successful with all the Victorian teams running well and enjoying themselves.

Count back for 2nd & 3rd

Flyball Nationals 2023

This September, Frankston Dog Obedience Club had three Frankston Storm Flyball teams travel to Canberra for the 2023 Australian Flyball National Championships. This was the largest number of teams we have ever sent to an interstate Flyball Nationals. The Frank & Weans, captained by Josh hit the lanes in division 3, the Lightning Bolts, captained by Lauren D were seeded in division 5 and the Hurricanes, captained by Tash, landed in Division 11.





When racing began on the Saturday we saw the close racing you would expect to see at nationals. We saw nail biting finishes from all three teams, where everyone was left staring at the times (which were at times only hundredths of a second apart) to find out the winner, with the judges and line stewards unable to call the races by eye. After a gruelling day of racing on the Saturday all three teams headed into the Sunday leading or tied for first place in their divisions.

Sunday morning the teams arrived refreshed and ready to fight to keep their places at the top of their respective divisions. With a day of nailing starts and crosses under our belts we started to pull ahead, we no longer had to look at the clock to call the winners. And as the day continued it was clear that our teams had the stamina needed to race two full days and while our times remained as consistent Sunday afternoon as they had been Saturday morning our opponents started to slow just a little bit. We could focus on running our best races and let the other teams worry about catching us.



At the completion of the event the three teams emerged victorious as Division 3, 5 and 11 Australian Flyball Nationals Champions. To top off a brilliant achievement, Frankston Dog Obedience Club was then awarded the prestigious Malcolm Steward Award. This award is presented to the club with the highest percentage of wins over the weekend. This award is usually won by small clubs who send 1, perhaps on occasion 2 teams to nationals. To win this award with 3 teams is an incredible achievement that we believe had never happened before.

This year in another massive achievement, we also had 7 year old junior handler, Aylah, independently handle a dog as part of one of our winning teams. Without any adult support, she handled the dog proficiently, nailing her crosses and starts with the professionalism of any adult in the team.

These achievements show the enormous value of the training program our dogs work through week in week out to not only learn to complete a flyball run, but also develop strength, body awareness and control, fitness and stamina.

I want to acknowledge the following brilliant handlers and dogs as 2023 Flyball National Champions. These teams worked together like a well-oiled machine and should be incredibly proud of their achievements.

Summer Enrichment Ideas

Enrichment for animals is about providing safe and managed opportunities for species appropriate behaviours. For our dogs, this means we have to provide opportunities for them to sniff, forage, chew, play, run, use their brain...

Summertime can be a great opportunity to get creative with these activities as the weather can restrict our options. Here are some ideas!

Food related- offer frozen foods. This could be Greek yogurt, berries, meats or bones that have been frozen to keep your dog cool and add an extra level of difficulty for our hardcore chewers! Always supervise the consumption of bones.

Environmental- set up cool zones in the house or yard. This could mean you have a shell pool with clean water available, or a shaded area protected from the sun. Maybe this means buying a cool mat or allowing your dog to lie on the tiles.

Sensory- giving your dog the opportunity to engage their senses. Plant dog safe herbs or flowers, groom them with different textured brushes, turn on the tv or radio for them while you're away or include something hydrating and tasty in their meals like cucumber or bone broth.

Social- set up play dates at the beach or dam with their favourite people or dogs. Alternatively, invite them over to keep out of the heat!

Rest & exercise- keep your walks to the early morning or late night to avoid burnt paws and heatstroke. Make sure your dogs have somewhere cool to rest during the summer and that clean water is always readily available.

Tactile/learning- use the nice cool grass outside to set up nature's snuffle mat by spreading some dry treats into the grass for the dog to sniff out. You could also engage their brain in some summer trick training kikopup on YouTube has heaps of tutorials!

Enrichment doesn't have to be hard and expensive but I hope these ideas keep you and your dog busy over the warmer months!



Alternative Behaviour - Cue It!

An alternative means one of many available possibilities, and when we are looking at training an alternative behaviour for our dogs undesirable behaviours, we come to realise the available possibilities are endless. However, for many of the undesirable behaviours, we can opt to put the behaviour on cue and give the dog an opportunity to display this behaviour at times we deem appropriate.

Let's discuss.

An example of this method that comes straight to mind for me is Blue. As a young pup, Blue loved jumping onto us, from the floor, from the furniture, and he would do giant leaps - he absolutely loved it! This obviously isn't a behaviour that we wanted exhibited randomly or to other people, as that can become a dangerous situation. However, he enjoyed this behaviour so much we wanted to keep it around as a high level reinforcer for him.

So we taught him how to jump onto our shoulders to get caught and carried in our arms. This was fairly easy once he figured out we were trying to catch him. And we put this behaviour on cue, just like you would a sit or a drop. He had two cues that had to be used together to make sure he never accidentally decided to jump at an inappropriate time - clap of the hands, "okay" and he could run and jump from a distance to get on our shoulders.





He had since never jumped, or even put his paws on, anyone that didn't request him to do so. This alternate behaviour for his undesirable jumping worked really well for us! This was his most valued life reward and came in super handy in his flyball career. All from an annoying puppy that wouldn't stop jumping on us. I've had to change this behaviour again to adjust for his age. He now can run up to me while I'm crouched on the floor and I will catch him and pick him up so his older body isn't strained. So when we are looking at an alternative behaviour for our dogs "naughty" or "undesirable" behaviours, one of the many possibilities we have is to keep that behaviour and put it on cue, so it is used only at times that we deem fit. Choosing this method is just one of many methods and may not work for the undesirable behaviour you are experiencing with your dog. Discuss with your instructor if you are after more information on alternatives.

This graphic by Lili Chin & Elizabeth Weiss holds the same idea, sometimes our dogs are trying to communicate something they NEED, but we see it as undesirable. Blue needed to jump and put his paws on people, by putting it on cue we were able to get the best of both worlds.



Ignoring a dog for long stretches at a time and then reprimanding him for seeking attention is counterproductive. Reprimands are a form of attention. Behaviors that earn the dog attention will increase in frequency. Reprimands only confuse the dog.

- I. KEEP YOUR DOG BUSY: GIVE HIM SOMETHING TO DO.
- 2. WHEN YOU TAKE BREAKS, (PLEASE) DON'T FORGET TO PAY ATTENTION TO YOUR DOG.
- 3. TEACH/REWARD YOUR DOG TO RELAX ON HIS BED.
- 4. GIVE YOUR DOG EXERCISE, PLAY AND MENTAL STIMULATION EVERY DAY.



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
